Dennis Oppenheim's design includes metal trees and a huge basketball hoop attempting to evoke a tornado (perhaps not the most appealing idea for this part of the country).

Decisions on public art are not and should not be made solely by artists. Other people should be encouraged to get involved as well. That will help Kansas City's art scene thrive.
